Lyft is providing transportation assistance to Colorado residents impacted by the recent Marshall wildfires. FEMA Assistance for Residents & Businesses

and then apply for federal assistance. If you do not have rental or home insurance, please apply for FEMA assistance.

FEMA has made disaster assistance available to Marshall Fire victims, and they can begin applying for assistance by registering online at www.DisasterAssistance.gov or by calling 1-800-621-3362. Those without insurance are also eligible for assistance from FEMA.

Residents and business owners who sustained losses in the designated counties can begin applying for assistance tomorrow by registering online [here](#) or by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY) for the hearing and speech impaired. The toll-free telephone numbers will operate from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (local time) seven days a week until further notice. If you use a relay service, such as video relay service (VRS), captioned telephone service or others, give FEMA the number for that service.
